Inpatient hospitalization 2. Psychiatric residential treatment and substance abuse residential treatment 3. Partial hospitalization programs (PHPs) 4. Intensive outpatient programs (IOPs) 5. Traditional outpatient treatment
Life-Threatening Emergency	<p>Immediate intervention is required to prevent death or serious harm to patient or others.</p>
Living Will	<p>A legal document also known as a medical directive or advance directive. It states your wishes regarding life support or other medical treatment in certain circumstances, usually when death is imminent.</p>
Long-Term Care	<p>A variety of services that help people with their medical and non-medical needs over a period of time. Long-term care can be provided at home, in the community, or in various types of facilities, including nursing homes and assisted living facilities. Most long-term care is custodial care. Medicare doesn't pay for this type of care if this is the only kind of care you need.</p>
